Even if you don't have high blood pressure, it's important to take steps to keep it under control since it tends to get higher with age. Start with <u>lifestyle changes</u> to lower your blood pressure like losing excess weight and cutting back on salt. If those measures don't help sufficiently, drugs usually can. But be vigilant because our latest <u>Best Buy Drugs report on high blood pressure drugs</u> found that some doctors start with newer, heavily advertised drugs when a much less expensive class of medication--diuretics--are at least as safe and effective.
